Dress code

We would like as many of you as possible to feel at home at the event, while preserving its special nature. To achieve this, we have introduced a dress code to ensure that you truly feel that what may otherwise seem strange, is part of everyday life here.

This means that we will monitor the attire of visitors throughout the entire event. As stated in the declaration section, those who do not comply, unfortunately, cannot participate in the event and must leave the venue. In this case, we are unable to offer a refund or compensation, so it is important not to aim for the minimum when planning your attire. Attire, that's not allowed

It's difficult to list everything that is allowed, so it's simpler to highlight the clothing and accessories that we definitely cannot allow into the event:

- Everyday wear, basically any clothing in which you blend into the crowd on the street.
- Nudity and the absence of clothing do not count as accessories, so just as a T-shirt and jeans won't suffice, neither will just the jeans without the T-shirt (or just the T-shirt). This means that you cannot enter half-naked or naked unless you wear some accessories.
- Weapons and replicas cannot be brought into the event area, even if they are part of
 your thematic attire and meet the general expectations and safety requirements for
 cosplay props. Therefore, we ask you not to bring weapons or weapon replicas with
 you! This includes any sort of knife, even if it's a small pocketknife!
- Symbols of hate/totalitarianism, as defined by law, are strictly prohibited! In addition, symbols that are not explicitly against the law, but in any way relate to (or known to be associated with) communities using such symbols, or clearly resemble (or relate to) such symbols, are prohibited.

Although our goal is uniqueness, diversity, and self-expression, unfortunately, there are kinks/fetishes that we cannot admit to the event, mostly for practical reasons. These include the following, and while not all of them are related to attire, we felt it best to list them here:

- ABDL, babyfur
- Kinks that are not acceptable from a hygiene standpoint.
- Any fetish based on bodily harm (basically anything that leaves lasting marks for more than a few minutes or is aimed at causing severe pain).
- Breathplay (deprivation of air, and similar practices), there will be alcohol consumption and loud music at the venue, making this unsafe.

What should I wear?

As mentioned earlier, it's difficult to list everything, but the following examples should provide some guidance:

- Fursuit, murrsuit (partial or full)
- Pup masks, tail, harnesses, straps, collars
- Cuffs, gags, jockstraps and similar accessories
- Gas masks, helmets, silicone masks (NOT novelty ones), other types of masks and hoods
- Shibari and other types of bondage (within reasonable limits)
- Kigurumi
- Bodysuits, and clothing made of leather, faux leather, spandex, latex, neoprene, silicone
- Military attire and accessories (in accordance with the exceptions mentioned earlier)
- Motorcycle or MX (motocross) gear
- Striped stockings, lace, fishnet, sexy lingerie, generally sexy/seductive clothing (femboys included)

In short, anything that's provocative, naughty, or unconventional. The key is to be yourself and show a hidden side of yourself that you rarely reveal in everyday life.
